***ICIMOD PHOTOGRAPHIC COLLECTION: REQUEST FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC CONTRIBUTIONS**

One of the aims of ICIMOD is to provide a means whereby information can be shared among all those concerned with mountain development. Because much of such information can be provided by photographs, ICIMOD intends to establish a photographic "library" dealing with all subjects relating to the mountains. From this "library" ICIMOD will then be able to provide users with some or all of the photographic material they require for illustration of documents, newsletters etc.

Already ICIMOD has a nucleus of black and white photographs mainly concerned with watershed management in Nepal. But the ICIMOD region covers Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Burma, China, India and Pakistan as well, and photographs taken in these countries are particularly needed for the collection.

ICIMOD is soliciting any sort of photograph (black and white prints, color prints and color slide transparencies) of any size and of any format, covering a wide variety of subjects such as Forestry, Erosion Control, Irrigation, General Watershed Management, National Parks, Off-Farm Employment, Rural Energy, Mountain Engineering, etc. ICIMOD will welcome any photographs of these subjects that you feel you can contribute to their "library."

*CNAS SEMINAR ON FOLK STUDIES

A seminar on "Folk Studies" was held on February 15, 1985 at CNAS. Mr. Khadga Bikram Shah, Executive Director of CNAS, in a welcome address, said that the study of folklore could help overcome socio-cultural and economic problems in a developing country. He also remarked that folklore would preserve cultural heritage, provide social entertainment and could be used in the development of communication at the same time.

The program of the seminar was as follows:

Mr. S.M. Joshi's paper on "Folklore Genres of Nepal" dealt with the 350-year-old folk play belonging to the period of Siddhinarsingh Malla and examined its humor and satire on socio-economic conditions.

Mr. Harihar Bhattarai's paper on "Folklore Studies in Nepal: Problems and Prospects" highlighted the role of folklore in Nepalese studies as a major theme and discussed its functional aspects and problems in the national context.

Dr. Ruth-Inge Heinze's paper on "Urban Shamanism" attempted to prove that shamans are not only the end product of a tradition but also modern citizens with the potential to develop new traditions.

Dr. George De Vos in his paper on "Kappa: Japanese Example of the Modern Transmutation of Folklore into Popular Cultural Media" led a discussion on the role of the comic book media in replacing oral literature in contemporary societies.
