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## ABOUT THE AUTHORS

**Thomas E. Lovejoy**, Counselor to the Secretary on Biodiversity and Environmental Affairs at the Smithsonian Institution, is a distinguished tropical and conservation biologist. He has worked on the Brazilian Amazon since 1965 and is generally credited with having brought the tropical forest problem to the fore as a public issue. In addition to founding *Nature*, the popular public television series, Dr. Lovejoy is the author of more than 150 articles and several collaborative books, including *Key Environments: Amazonia* (1985), *Conservation of Tropical Forest Birds* (1985), and *Ecology, Conservation and Management of Southeast Asian Rainforests* (1995). A former president of the American Institute of Biological Sciences, he currently serves as the Scientific Adviser to the United Nations Environment Program.

**Danilo Antón** is a Professor of Human and Economic Geography at the Universidad de la República of Montevideo and of Environmental Policies at the Catholic University of Uruguay. He served for thirteen years as a Senior Program Officer at the International Development Research Center of Canada, and as such was responsible for environmental and natural resources projects worldwide, particularly in Latin America. With practical experience in over 30 countries and competence in five languages, he is the author of several books and more than two dozen scholarly articles. Among his recent publications are *Thirsty Cities: Urban Environments and Water Supply in Latin America* (1993), *Diversity, Globalization and the Ways of Nature* (1995), "Globalization and the Nation-State" (1996), and *Conocimiento sin Barreras* (1996). In 1998-99, he will be a Visiting International Faculty member at Macalester College.

**Sallie McFague** is the E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Professor of Theology at The Divinity School of Vanderbilt University. She has taught at Smith College and the Yale Divinity School in addition to serving as a Visiting Professor at the Harvard Divinity School and Cambridge University. Her numerous writings, which have won the American Academy of Religion Award for Excellence, reflect her interest in Christian attitudes toward the natural world. Her major works include *Metaphorical Theology: Models of God in Religious Language* (1982), *Models of God: Theology for and Ecological, Nuclear Age* (1987), *The Body of God: An Ecological Theology* (1993), and *Super, Natural Christians: How We Should Love Nature* (1997).
