**Ifi Amadiume** is Professor of Religion and African and Afro-American Studies at Dartmouth and Chair of African and African American Studies. She earned her Ph.D. in Social Anthropology from the University of London. She is a prolific writer of poetry as well as academic treatises. Among her publications are *Male Daughters, Female Husbands: Gender and Sex in an African Society* (1987, 1994), *Passion Waves* (1985), *Ecstasy* (1995), *Reinventing Africa: Matriarchy, Religion and Culture* (1997), and *Daughters of the Goddess and Daughters of Imperialism: African Women Struggle for Power and Democracy* (2000). She won the 1998-99 Choice Outstanding Academic Book Award. Further, she is part of a collaborative research project on "The Civil Status of God," sponsored by CODESRIA.

Asma Barlas is Associate Professor and Chair of the Department of Politics at Ithaca College. She also directs the Center for the Study of Culture, Race, and Ethnicity. Her Ph.D. in International Studies was earned at the University of Denver, and her undergraduate work was done at Kinnaird College in Pakistan. She also received an M.A. in Journalism from the University of the Punjab, Pakistan. Her book, *Democracy, Nationalism, and Communalism: The Colonial Legacy in South Asia*, was published in 1995. Her article on "The Quran and Hermeneutics: Reading the Quran's Opposition to Patriarchy," is forthcoming in *The Journal of Quranic Studies*, and a book titled "*Believing Women:*" Sex/Gender and Patriarchy in the Quran is forthcoming from the University of Texas Press.

Her books include *English is Broken Here: Notes on Cultural Fusion in the Americas* (1995) and *Corpus Delecti: Performance Art of the Americas* (1999).
