parameters, there were no situations where the AKWUA Strategy was not effective. More detailed work still needs to be done with sensitivity and examination of some of the basic assumptions. The effects of certain stochastic inputs such as water availability have yet to be studied. Until this further work is done, care should be exercised in attempting to apply the AKWUA Strategy to situations which may differ significantly from the context in which it was developed.
